Vanderbilt Plays Host to Middle Tennessee

Vanderbilt (17-18 overall, 3-13 SEC) plays host to Middle Tennessee (21-19, 3-9 Sun Belt) Tuesday at 7 p.m., looking to regroup following a three-game losing streak at No.11 Florida last weekend. The Commodores have lost nine straight in league play but own a current three-game winning streak against non-conference foes.

Commodore hitters are swinging hot bats over the past six games, batting .342 with 49 runs scored, 69 hits, nine doubles and nine home runs. Leading the way is senior first baseman Sean Luellwitz who is batting .533 (16-for-30) with five doubles, two home runs and 13 RBI during his current eight-game hit streak. The hit streak is tied for the longest of his career and leads all VU hitters this season. He leads the team with 19 multi-hit games and 13 multi-RBI games.

Middle Tennessee enters the game with a four-game losing streak, dropping all three games with South Alabama last weekend in Mobile, Ala. Justin Sims leads all Blue Raider hitters with a .406 average, 10 home runs and 40 RBI. Chuck Akers leads the team with 14 stolen bases.

Vanderbilt will start freshman right-hander Jeff Sues (3-1, 7.11 ERA). Middle Tennessee will send freshman right-hander Chris Mobley to the mound (3-3, 6.49 ERA).

The Middle Tennessee Series

Vanderbilt leads the all-time series with Middle Tennessee 72-34 dating back to 1926.

The two teams split a pair of meetings last season with Middle Tennessee winning, 19-3, in Murfreesboro and Vanderbilt winning, 9-8, in Nashville a month later. Commodore pitchers allowed a season-high 22 hits against the Blue Radiers in the first meeting. Former Commodore Ashley Freeman hit a three-run homer and senior Chris Broadus hit a two-RBI double to spark the Commodores to the victory in Nashville.

Vanderbilt has won seven of the last 10 games in the series.

What's On Deck

Vanderbilt returns to action in the Southeastern Conference this weekend when Mississippi State comes to Nashville for a three-game series at Hawkins Field. The Commodores will be looking to snap a nine-game losing streak against league opponents.

Last Time Out

Mark Kiger went 3-for-4 with two RBI and Jonathan Tucker went 4-for-5 with an RBI to lead Florida to a 7-3 win over Vanderbilt Sunday, April 21, at McKethan Field.

Vanderbilt suffered its third consecutive Southeastern Conference sweep and falls below .500 for the first time this season at 17-18 overall, 3-13 in the league. Florida wins its fourth straight and improves to 30-12 overall, 11-7 in the conference.

Florida took an early 4-0 lead after two innings. Right fielder Mario Garza put the Gators ahead 1-0 after one inning when he hit a RBI-double to left field to score third baseman Mark Kiger.

Florida went up 4-0 in the second on a RBI single by Kiger and a two-run homer to right field by center fielder Matt Goss.

Vanderbilt scored three times in the third inning to cut the Florida lead to 4-3. Left fielder

John Kaye led off the inning with a towering home run over the scoreboard in right field for the Commodores first run of the game. First baseman Sean Luellwitz later hit a slow ground ball through the right side of the infield with two on to score second baseman Chris Broadus and catcher Jonathan Douillard.

The Gators pulled away in the seventh innings, scoring twice. Kiger hit a bases-loaded ground out to second base that scored Tucker. During the play Kiger was caught in a run down between first and second base before reaching second safely. During the run down Brian Rose came in from second base to give Florida a 6-3 lead.

Florida tacked on another run in the eighth on a RBI double by Tucker. But the Commodores could not plate another run in the game and left eight runners on base.

Florida starter Keith Ramsey (5-2) earned the win. He pitched 5.2 innings, allowing four hits three earned runs and struck out six Commodores. Reliever Jamie Goldfarb registered his second save of the year. Vanderbilt starter Jeff Little (4-5) took the loss. He pitched 6.0 innings, gave up 11 hits, two earned runs and walked six.

Chris Broadus (2-for-4) and Jonathan Douillard (2-for-3) led all Vanderbilt hitters.

Who's Hot

• **Vanderbilt's offense** has posted 49 runs on 69 hits, nine doubles and nine home runs over the last six games. The Commodores have hit at least one home run in each of their last four games and 11 in their last 10 games.

• **Sean Luellwitz** is batting .533 (16-for-30) with five doubles, two home runs and 13 RBI during his current eight-game hit streak. The hit streak is tied for the longest of his career and leads all VU hitters this season. He leads the team with 19 multi-hit games and 13 multi-RBI games.

• **Chris Broadus** is hitting .391 (9-of-23) during his current six-game hit streak, the longest

of his VU career. He has five RBI and seven runs scored during the streak.

• **John Kaye** has homered in each of the last three games for the Commodores and is tied with Luellwitz for team-high honors. He hit a towering home run over the scoreboard in right field at McKethan Stadium last weekend at Florida in Sunday's 7-3 loss to the Gators.

• Third baseman **Cesar Nicolas** has not committed an error in his last 21 games (since 3/13-Belmont). He committed eight errors in his first 14 games of the year.

Sowers Debut Worthy Of SEC Pitcher of the Week Honors

Vanderbilt freshman left-hander Jeremy Sowers was named Southeastern Conference Pitcher of the Week for February 25.

A product of Louisville's Ballard High School, Sowers made his collegiate debut at Louisville (2/24), striking out 10 Cardinals, scattering four hits — all singles — and allowing only one earned run. Vanderbilt held off Louisville in the late innings to win 6-5. His 10 strikeouts were a Commodore season-high and the most by a Vanderbilt pitcher since current senior right-hander Steven Faulkner struck out 13 Ole Miss batters April 29, 2001.

Only four Commodore pitchers have earned the award since the conference started honoring both a position player and pitcher in 1987. Sowers is the first Vanderbilt pitcher to garner recognition since Phillip Haigler earned the award for the week of April 29, 1996. Mike McLochlin (April 24, 1989) and Scott Newell (April 13, 1992) were Vanderbilt's first recipients.

"He had a great outing considering it was the first time he took the mound at the college level," head coach Roy Mewbourne said. "It was a pressure situation with him pitching in his hometown against his hometown's university. He handled everything well and gave us a chance to win the ball game."

Vanderbilt Baseball's New Home — Hawkins Field



The 2002 season begins with great anticipation as the newly completed Hawkins Field takes centerstage, showcasing Vanderbilt's commitment to Commodore baseball.

Still nestled alongside Vanderbilt Stadium and Memorial Gymnasium on the west end of campus, Hawkins Field features a modern design with a classic baseball park atmosphere, including brick and iron features, more than 1,500 chair-back seats and a 35-foot-tall left field wall.

Vanderbilt's first home since McGugin Field was introduced 76 years ago, Hawkins Field will officially be dedicated April 27, 2002, honoring the Hawkins family. A long-time contributor to the Vanderbilt community, Charles Hawkins III played both football and baseball at Vanderbilt from 1952-54 and became the first Commodore pitcher to earn All-Southeastern Conference honors. He donated more than \$2 million toward the construction of the stadium. His father, Charles Hawkins II, lettered in both football and baseball at Vanderbilt in the mid-1920s.

Hawkins Field Construction Phases

Phase I — Began immediately following the 2000 season and consisted of demolishing McGugin Field and erecting a new playing surface. This included:

- moving the field 45 feet along the first base line
- installing a drainage system that can percolate 13 inches of rain an hour
- laying TiffSport Grass
- constructing a unique 35-foot wall in left field along Memorial Gym
- installing brick along the backstop
- adding additional lighting

Phase II — Began immediately following the 2001 season and consisted of building a new grandstand and press box. This included:

- demolishing the old press box
- constructing the main entrance and external facade with brick and iron
- building the grandstand area and installing 1,598 chair-back seats
- adding a fully operational press box
- upgrading the stadium sound system

Week 11: Evansville, at Florida

Vanderbilt swept Evansville (5-4, 14-3) in a two-game series in Nashville. Run-scoring singles by Scott Vanderhoff and Sean Luellwitz propelled VU to a 5-4 win over the Purple Aces in game one. Vanderbilt erupted for eight-runs in the fourth inning sparked by a two-run home run by Luellwitz.

Florida swept Vanderbilt (13-7, 8-7, 7-3) in Gainesville. VU lost an early 5-0 in the third inning of Friday's game. VU scored four times in the eighth inning in the second game but its rally fell short in an 8-7 loss. Sunday saw the Commodores manage only six hits and three runs off UF pitching in a 7-3 loss.

John Kaye homered in all three games for the Commodores. VU starting pitchers registered the loss in each game.

**Week 10: at Austin Peay,
South Carolina**

Vanderbilt went 1-3 with a 6-5 win over Austin Peay and three losses to No. 7 South Carolina (7-5, 10-1, 20-13). The Commodores scored three times in the ninth against the Governors to end a season-high four game losing streak.

The Gamecocks outscored Vanderbilt 37-19 in sweeping the series. VU's losing streak in the series climbs to 17 straight. The Commodores set season-highs for runs scored (13), RBI (12) and home runs (three) in the series finale, but could not match the offensive power of USC.

Week 9: at Western Ky., at Ole Miss

Vanderbilt lost all four games during the week, including a 13-6 loss at Western Kentucky and a series sweep by Ole Miss (9-0, 6-1, 10-9 [10 inn.]).

A first-inning grand slam by right fielder Antone Towns and a seventh-inning three-run home run by second baseman Patrick Ransdell powered the Hilltoppers to the victory on 4/3.

For Vanderbilt, Chris Broadus ended the day 3-for-4 with two doubles and two runs scored. Teammates Scott Vanderhoff, Cesar Nicolas and Tony Mansolino each posted two hits at the plate.

Ole Miss had little troubles with the Commodores in each of the first two games, allowing only four hits in game one and six hits in game two. Vanderbilt blew an eighth-inning 9-1 lead and lost in extra innings in the series finale.

Week 8: at Tennessee Tech, Arkansas

Tennessee Tech scored nine times in the second inning and won easily over Vanderbilt 12-7 on March 27 at Quillen Field. Tennessee Tech took advantage of six walks by Vanderbilt pitchers in the second frame including four by freshman right-hander Scott Shapiro (2-1). TTU's big inning was highlighted by a bases-loaded three-RBI double to center field by Cole Helms and a two-RBI triple to center field.

Vanderbilt snapped a four-game losing streak when it defeated Arkansas 4-3 Sunday, March 31 in the lone-game of a rain-shortened series. The game originally began on Saturday but rained halted the contest until Sunday afternoon. VU scored three times in the fourth on RBI singles by Chris Broadus, Karl Nonemaker and Cesar Nicolas.

35. *Roy Mewbourne, VU (30)	912

The 30th season as a collegiate head coach promises to be special for Vanderbilt's Roy Mewbourne. In a season that has already seen him earn his 900th career win (2/16-West Virginia) the 56-year-old skipper has seen his dream of a new stadium come to fruition with the unveiling of Hawkins Field.

A catalyst in the stadium's construction, Mewbourne has played a vital role in fundraising, planning and oversight, and now has his Commodores charting a new future in Vanderbilt baseball.

Over the years the personable Mewbourne has earned the respect of his peers and players alike by combining a strong desire for success with his warm, friendly personality.

Amassing a **915-672-9** overall record and a **648-599-9** mark in 24 seasons at Vanderbilt, Mewbourne is the winningest coach in school history. **He is the 35th coach in college baseball history to reach the 900-win plateau. His career victories total ranks third in the Southeastern Conference and among the 25 best in the nation for active coaches.**

A nine-time "Coach of the Year" selection, Mewbourne has mentored several future stars while directing numerous squads to championships and appearances in both the NCAA and the NAIA tournaments. Hunter Bledsoe, the 1999 SEC Player of the Year, is one of 10 All-Americans and 19 All-SEC honorees to play for Mewbourne. Along with Bledsoe, 55 other Commodore players have inked professional baseball contracts after collegiate careers under Mewbourne.

Mewbourne has fielded some outstanding teams in his Vanderbilt tenure, highlighted by his 1980 squad that captured the SEC championship and earned him SEC Coach of the Year honors. At the same time, Mewbourne stresses excellence in the classroom. Ninety-five Commodores have earned Academic All-SEC honors since his arrival, including a school-record and league-best 13 last season.

Mewbourne came to Vanderbilt in 1979 from Birmingham-Southern College, a school which inducted him into its Hall of Fame in 2000. Mewbourne compiled a 267-74 record in six years, while being named NAIA District 27 Coach of the Year in 1973, 1974, 1975 and 1978. The Birmingham native was honored as the NAIA Area 5 Coach of the Year in 1974 and 1975 and the Southern States Conference Coach of the Year in 1978.

Like Sowers, Wessel and Willis passed up MLB dollars to play at Vanderbilt. Wessel turned down the Chicago White Sox. Willis said no to the Cincinnati Reds... Wessel led all SEC pitchers with 97 SO in 1970... In 1970 Wessel struck out 23 batters vs. UT-Chattanooga (3/23/02); tied for third most in a game in NCAA history... Willis ranks No. 1 in VU history with 350 career strikeouts.... As a sophomore in 1970, Willis tied Wessel with 97 strikeouts for the Commodores... Prior transferred to Southern California after his freshman campaign... Prior won the Golden Spikes Award (college baseball's equivalent to the Heisman Trophy) last season with the USC Trojans. Week 7: at Memphis, Georgia Series

Despite its first ranking since 1998, the No. 29 (Collegiate Baseball) Commodores suffered their first SEC series sweep at home since 1997 (vs. Florida) when the Bulldogs took all three games in Nashville.

Vanderbilt starting pitchers surrendered 29 hits, 24 R, 21 ER and 13 BB with 13 SO against Georgia. Each starter was tagged with the loss. In the series the Bulldogs scored 34 runs on 40 hits, while VU scored 14 runs on 31 hits.

It was Georgia's second straight sweep of Vanderbilt in as many seasons. VU has lost six straight to the Bulldogs.

The Memphis game was canceled due to rain.

Week 6: Belmont, at LSU Series

John Kaye's game-winning two-RBI double completed a three-run ninth as Vanderbilt rallied to win the rubber match of its three-game series with then-No. 7 LSU, 8-7. Sean Luellwitz's two homers and four RBI also helped paved the way for the upset.

VU lost the series opener 6-0 despite a decent outing from its ace pitcher Jeremy Sowers. Jeff Little helped even the series at a game apiece the following day, throwing a complete-game six hitter.

The series win was Vanderbilt's first against LSU since 1988 and the first in Baton Rouge since 1957. Vanderbilt joins the 2000 Georgia Bulldogs as the only squads from the
