Vanderbilt Heads to the Sunshine State For Four Games

With its season-long nine-game homestand completed, Vanderbilt travels to Jacksonville, Fla., this week for four games, including three in the Kennel Club Classic hosted by North Florida. The Commodores, who battled cloudy overcast skies and cold and wet conditions, went 5-4 on the homestand and now look forward to seeing the Florida sunshine.

Vanderbilt continues to impress with outstanding pitching and solid defense. Through 11 games, the Commodore pitching staff has a collective 2.29 ERA, is limiting opposing hitters to a .214 batting average, and has recorded 97 strikeouts to 37 walks. VU pitchers have allowed only one home run this season. Defensively, the Commodores have coughed up only six errors in 437 chances.

At the same time, though, Vanderbilt has struggled at the plate, hitting .256 on the year. But Vanderbilt has only been out-hit by its opponent twice this season, losing both games.

Offensively, Vanderbilt is led by junior first baseman Cesar Nicolas (15-for-37, .405 AVG). Nicolas went 8-for-13 (.615) with two RBI, two runs scored and a pair of doubles during the three-game Music City Classic last weekend in Nashville. Freshman outfielder Warner Jones ranks second on the team with a .386 average (17-for-44). He has hit safely in nine of VU's 11 games, including the last four.

The Vanderbilt bullpen has been impressive thanks to the pitching of Jeff Sues (2-0, 1.26 ERA), John Scoot (0.00 ERA in 8.0 IP), Jensen Lewis (1-1, 0.82 ERA) and Matt Buschmann (1.80 ERA, 2 saves).

Preseason second team All-American Jeremy Sowers (0-2, 3.86 ERA) has pitched well despite a lack of run support. Sowers has struck out 30 and walked only six in a team-high 23.1 innings.

Sowers Strikes Out 12 But Kansas Outlasts Vanderbilt, 4-2

NASHVILLE, Tenn. - Vanderbilt starter Jeremy Sowers struck out 12 batters but was touched up for three runs in the fifth inning as No. 17 Kansas rallied past the Commodores, 4-2, Sunday, March 2 at Hawkins Field. The Jayhawks improve to 13-4 on the season. Vanderbilt drops to 6-5 after losing two of three games in the Music City Classic.

Trailing 2-1 heading into the fifth inning, Kansas' Ryan Baty tied the

Vanderbilt Head Coach Tim Corbin

After nine seasons as an assistant coach at baseball power Clemson, Tim Corbin moves into the role of Commodore head coach in 2003 and looks to construct similar success at Vanderbilt.

Corbin helped the Tiger program produce more victories than all but four programs in the nation from 1994-2002. Clemson won more than 71 percent (434 wins, 172 losses) of its games, captured two Atlantic Coast Conference regular season titles, made nine appearances in the NCAA Tournament and fought its way to the **College World Series four times** (1995, 1996, 2000, and 2002) while Corbin assisted head coach Jack Leggett. **The Tigers ended the 2002 season with their ninth consecutive top 25 finish and their sixth top 10 finish since 1994.**

Joining Clemson as an assistant coach in 1994, Corbin worked his way up the Tiger coaching staff. Earning two promotions, Corbin received the title of assistant head coach in 1998 before becoming the associate head coach and recruiting coordinator in September 2001.

Along the way the organized, focused and enthusiastic understudy earned a national reputation as one of the most respected assistant coaches in the country. **He worked intensely while collecting nine talented recruiting classes — all of which were recognized among the top 25 in the nation.** His on-field work developing outfielders and hitters helped 20 Clemson players earn All-America accolades while 34 Tigers were later drafted to play professional baseball.

Corbin's dedication and attention to detail caught the eye of the national baseball publication *Baseball America* on numerous occasions. In 1997, it touted the Clemson coaching staff as one of the top five "College Recruiting Staffs" in the country. It later tabbed the 1999 Tiger freshman class as No. 1 nationally. **And in 2000, *Baseball America* and the American Baseball Coaches Association named Corbin its National Coach of the Year.**

In 2000, Southern California head coach Mike Gillespie served as skipper of the USA Baseball team and quickly chose Corbin as an assistant on his staff. The staff helped guide the Americans to a gold-medal finish at the World Championships in the Netherlands, setting a record for best winning percentage (.900).

Prior to his tenure at Clemson, Corbin served as head coach at Presbyterian College for six seasons beginning in 1988. Restarting a baseball program that laid dormant for several years, Corbin directed Presbyterian College from NAIA to Division II status, posting a 106-138 overall record. Along the way, Corbin guided the Blue Hose to three consecutive appearances in the South Atlantic playoffs (1991-93) while earning South Atlantic Coach of the Year honors in 1990.

"He helped me a lot with the hitting aspects of my game. He knows a lot of the intricacies of different players' swings. So anytime you go into a slump, he knows the little things to point out and says them in a way to motivate you and help you turn around your swing.

"I've enjoyed knowing him off the field and going to his house and hanging out. I consider him as much a friend as any of the players on my team. He's a great person."

game with a RBI double into left-center field to plate Jason Appuhn who reached base with a leadoff walk. Kevin Wheeler gave the Jayhawks a 3-2 lead when he followed with a RBI single to right-center field that scored Baty. After a two-out single by Casey Spanish put runners on first and second, Travis Metcalf blooped a single to left field that scored Wheeler to give KU a 4-2 advantage it held throughout the remainder of the game.

Sowers (0-2) ended the day allowing eight hits, three walks and four earned runs in eighth innings of work. His 12 strikeouts tied a career-high set exactly one year ago in his Hawkins Field debut against Iowa.

Vanderbilt grabbed its only lead of the day, at 2-1, in the bottom of the fourth. Jeff Boutwell delivered a two-out two-RBI single to right field off KU starter Josh Duran that scored Matt Zeller and Ryan Klosterman.

Kansas took an early 1-0 lead in the third inning when Appuhn led off with a walk and scored on a RBI single by Wheeler.

After the fourth inning, Vanderbilt did not reach scoring position again until the ninth. VU's Rucker Taylor legged out a two-out infield single hit deep in the hole at shortstop. Warner Jones followed with a double down the right field line that pushed Taylor to third base. However, Zeller struck out to end the game.

Kansas reliever Brandon Johnson (3-1) earned the win. Johnson, who entered the game in the fifth for Duran, surrendered only four hits and a walk while striking out five Commodores. Chris Smart came on in the ninth and earned his third save.

Cesar Nicolas led all Vanderbilt hitters with a 3-for-4 outing at the plate. Boutwell went 2-for-4 with a pair of RBIs.

Scouting Jacksonville

Jacksonville began the 2003 season with the similar concerns shared by Vanderbilt — lack of experience. The Dolphins' feature 22 underclassmen (12-FR, 10-SO) on its 35-man roster.

After finishing the 2002 season ended with a 27-31 record, JU has been predicted to finish fourth in the Atlantic Sun Conference by league coaches and media.

Off to a 4-6 start, Jacksonville is led by Gordi Gronkowski (.486, 17 H, 7 RBI), Orlando Diaz (.308, 3 HR, 8 RBI) and Chad Hauseman (3 HR, 7 RBI). Darren Truty is 1-1 with a 3.60 ERA and 13 strikeouts in 20.0 innings.

Jacksonville leads the all-time series with Vanderbilt 2-0 thanks to a 4-3 win in 1970 and a 6-4 victory in 1997.

Scouting Central Michigan

Central Michigan returns 15 lettermen and six position players from a Chippewas squad that posted a 31-25 record and 14-10 Mid-American Conference mark last season.

The Chippewas, who are 1-2 entering the Kennel Club Classic, will play their first 16 non-conference games away from home. Top returners are senior Mike Gates (.324 career average with 24 HR and 142 RBI) senior right-hander Jeff Garner (4-4, 4.45 ERA in 2002) and junior left-hander T.J. Johnson (1-2, 2.15 ERA).

The Vanderbilt-Central Michigan series is tied 1-1. The Commodores won 6-5 in 1959 and lost 10-3 in 1960.

Scouting Michigan State

Michigan State returns 15 lettermen and three position players from a 2002 squad that finished 38-19 and third in the Big Ten. A year ago the Spartans set school records hits (685), runs (500), RBI (456) doubles (126) and home runs (95).

MSU's top returners include Freshman All-American Tim Day (11-3, 3.21 ERA), Bryan Gale (8-4, 4.77 ERA, 72 SO) and Brady Burrill (.414 AVG, 5 HR, 24 RBI).

Michigan State leads the all-time series 3-0 and defeated Vanderbilt 17-8 in the last meeting in 1993.

Scouting Notre Dame

Notre Dame is coming off one of its best seasons in school history, posting a 50-18 record, 18-8 first-place finish in the BIG EAST, and an appearance at the 2002 College World Series.

Top returners include senior outfielder Kris Billmaier (.313, 3 HR, 41 RBI), first baseman Joe Thaman (.272, 6 HR, 33 RBI) and second baseman Steve Sollmann (.362, 2 HR, 47 RBI). Senior right-hander J.P. Gagne (9-4, 3.14 ERA) leads an experience pitching staff.

Notre Dame leads the all-time series with Vanderbilt 3-2. The two teams last played in 1960, a 6-2 victory for Notre Dame.

- SEASON NOTES -

Klosterman Sets Single-Game Assists Record

Sophomore shortstop Ryan Klosterman set the Vanderbilt single-game record for assists with 11 against East Tennessee State in the Commodores' 5-4 win (2/18). The previous record was nine held by four former Commodores, including Terry Geshke (vs. Georgia [4/21/62]), Joey Jackson (vs. Rollins [3/4/86]), Dede Malmo (vs. Lipscomb [3/30/88]) and Brad Reese (vs. Memphis [3/11/90]).

While the Southeastern Conference does not have records for most assists, the NCAA record book lists only eight other players in collegiate baseball history to register more than 11 assists in a nine-inning game. The NCAA record is 14 set by Florida's Kevin Polcovich against Tennessee (4/27/91).

Klosterman recorded at least one assist in seven different innings. He was busiest in the second inning, when he made all three assists, and in the seventh and eighth innings when he lent a hand in two of the three outs.

Nicolas' Comeback Complete

Cesar Nicolas completed an amazing comeback when he made his first start of the season against East Tennessee State (2/18). The Vanderbilt junior infielder was inadvertently hit in the head with a swung bat, Jan. 18, in the batting cages adjacent to Hawkins Field. Nicolas suffered a mild concussion and

broken temporal bones on the right side of his head.

Originally expected to miss the first two to three weeks of the season, Nicolas made his first appearance as a pinch hitter in both the season opener against Old Dominion and the following game against The Citadel.

Sowers Garner Preseason Attention

Jeremy Sowers has earned second team All-America honors from *Baseball America* and third team All-America accolades from Louisville Slugger and "Collegiate Baseball" newspaper entering the 2003 season. *Baseball America* also tabbed him as the third-best sophomore in the country (at any position).

Sowers and Oklahoma left-hander David Purcey, who also earned second-team honors, were the only two sophomore hurlers to receive recognition from the *Baseball America* listing that included three All-America teams, honoring 15 pitchers. Sowers and Mississippi State junior left-hander Paul Maholm were the only pitchers from the Southeastern Conference represented.

Sowers was one of nine sophomore pitchers and 63 players overall chosen to the three teams selected by Louisville Slugger and "Collegiate Baseball." Sowers, Maholm and LSU senior right-hander Jake Tompkins were the three SEC pitchers honored.

pitchers nationwide to earn Freshman All-America honors from Louisville Slugger and "Collegiate Baseball." As the Commodores' top pitcher, Sowers went 6-5 while leading Vanderbilt in wins (six), ERA (4.37), innings pitched (101.0), strikeouts (85) and pickoffs (12). His 85 strikeouts tied for sixth-most by SEC pitchers and first among all freshmen hurlers in the league. His strikeout total also ranked third all-time among freshmen pitchers at Vanderbilt. His 101.0 innings pitched set a Vanderbilt record for freshmen pitchers.

Young 'Dores

The 2003 Vanderbilt Commodore baseball team is mostly young and unproven. Twenty players on the 27-man roster are underclassmen, including nine of the staff's 10 pitchers and six of the nine position players penciled into the lineup. The roster includes only six juniors and one senior.

Young Coaching Staff

Not to be outdone, the Commodore coaching staff ranks as one of the youngest in the conference. With an average age of 31.50 years old, the VU coaching staff is the second youngest in the SEC as the 2003 season starts. Only Georgia has a younger staff with an average age of 31.25.

The Commodore staff includes head coach Tim Corbin (42 years old), assistant coaches Derek Johnson (32) and Erik Bakich (25) and volunteer assistant Michael Holder (27).

In comparison, Georgia includes head coach David Perno (35), assistants Butch Thompson (32) and David Eckstein (29) and volunteer coach Jason Eller (29).

Three Players Join Team in January

Three Commodores joined the squad in January and are not listed in the 2003 edition of the Vanderbilt media guide.

Sophomore infielder **Gil Kim** set the single-season record for assists (75) last season at Middlebury (Vermont) while starting all 28 games and hitting .310 with three doubles 12 RBI and 10 stolen bases. At The Lawrenceville School, Kim was named a 2001 Prep School honorable mention and 2000 second team All-State Prep School by the *Trentonian*. He helped guide his high school to the New Jersey Prep "A" championship as a junior and to a runner up finish as a sophomore. In high school he batted .210 as a senior with a double, five RBI and five stolen

bases and hit .367 as a junior with three doubles, 10 RBI and 16 stolen bases.

Junior catcher/infielder **Mickey Kropf** started 33 of 40 games for the 2002 Ivy League Champion Harvard Crimson. Last season as a sophomore, Kropf batted .263 with seven doubles and nine RBI. He made three errors in 235 chances. Mickey is the younger brother of former Commodore catcher Andy Kropf (1997-2000) who now plays in the Detroit Tigers organization.

Sophomore right-hander **Giovanni Seretti** went through fall practice as a freshman member of the Duke Blue Devils last season. After sitting out the spring season, he transferred to Vanderbilt. Seretti joined the VU football team prior to 2002 season and was a defensive back on the scout team. As a senior at Loyola High School (Calif.), Seretti posted a 6-3 mark with a 3.02 ERA and 68 strikeouts in 56 innings pitched.

Tough Schedule Awaits Vanderbilt

Thirty-six games against 18 opponents with recent NCAA Tournament berths highlight the 2003 Vanderbilt baseball schedule. More than 65 percent of the Commodores' 55-game schedule consists of opponents that reached either the 2001 or 2002 NCAA Tournament, including four games against 2002 College World Series participants Notre Dame and South Carolina. Six games are scheduled against 2001 CWS participants Georgia and Tennessee. In all, Vanderbilt plays 13 games against teams that finished 2002 ranked among the top 25 in the country.
