This special issue provides a collection of innovative research on positioning, subjectivity, and identity relevant to disciplinary perspectives traversing psychology, anthropology, sociology, literary studies, and cultural studies. Research reported in the issue draws on ethnographic data collected in diverse contexts, including bars and youth prisons along the U.S.-Mexico border, public school classrooms in the U.S., and a Taiwanese bridal salon. Analyses work the tensions between, on the one hand, social identity formations that stretch across space and time, and on the other, events of positioning and subjectivity where individuals take up, recast, and resist socially-formed identities. An introduction to the issue engages the interanimation of social and psychological phenomena in a practice theory of identity, taking up the construct of identity laminations.
