Parlez-vous Français

My interest in the French language began when I returned to the university (after the children had grown) for an advanced



degree to permit me to teach at the high school level. A language was a requirement for the degree. I tried to resist, but the university held firm. I chose French. To my surprise, I had a great time learning a new language. After completing my Master's Degree, Sidney accepted a position as Visiting Professor in the laboratory of his colleague at the Pasteur Institute. We spent a glorious year in Paris. We had come to Nashville in 1959 from Baltimore, where I taught at Patapsco Neck Elementary School in Baltimore County. I quickly joined the League of Women Voters to learn about the city. Tillie Najjar, wife of the Chair of the Microbiology Department, introduced me to the Newcomer's Club and the Woman's Club. The LWV kept me busy with civic activities, including the issues of civil rights, and the Woman's Club offered cultural and social respite.

Like today, the early days of the Woman's Club offered various kinds of activities. I joined a Music program which allowed members to focus on a particular composer and discuss his/her (mostly his) music, as well as listen to parts of recordings. I was drawn onto the board by my dear friend and neighbor, Sara Lenhert, who headed the Welcoming Committee. It was her job to count (yes!) the pieces of silver and help arrange the annual holiday luncheons, held in the dining hall of the Women's dorm. At the time, the luncheon was a pot luck, with members setting tables, washing dishes afterwards, and counting that silver.

It is not easy to retain a language without much opportunity to use it. The Alliance Francaise is one outlet for me, but another is our little French circle which meets monthly for lunch. We sometimes struggle through the hour, and are always relieved to have a native, or more fluent speaker attending. I urge you to brush up on your high school/university French and join us for lunch and chat.


