### Understanding the Figures I

- Results from the OECS 2016 study are presented on right hand side of slides
- AmericasBarometer 2014/15 results presented on left hand side of slide
  - AmericasBarometer 14/15 regional averages are in green
- Purple lines indicate the OECS countries' position within the 2014/15 AmericasBarometer ranking



### Understanding the Figures II


- The data are presented by percentages or degrees
  - A percentage is a ratio or proportion of one group versus the total population
    - · For example: percentage of males in the total population
  - A degree is an expression of a variable that has been rescaled to fit a 0-100 scale and is the output of a sum of numbers divided by the total number of cases interviewed (that is, the *mean* or *average*)
    - For example: responses to the insecurity question are: "a lot," "some," "a little," or "none"
    - None **•** 0
    - A little \_\_\_\_\_ 33.33
    - Some 66.66
    - A lot 100
    - After the responses are coded to the above numbers, they are added up for every individual and divided by the number of people interviewed in the country (that is, the *mean* is calculated).
    - For example: the country mean (average) for insecurity in the country is 40 degrees




### **Summary of Selected Findings**

- 1. A majority in St. Kitts & Nevis, as in Trinidad & Tobago, identify security as the most important problem in their countries
- 2. Neighborhood insecurity is low in the OECS compared to the rest of the Americas
  - · Young adults, less wealthy people, and women report higher levels of insecurity
- 3. Around 1 in 10 people report crime victimization in the past year in Saint Lucia and in Dominica
- 4. Reports of illegal drug sales in one's neighborhood are comparatively high in Dominica and St. Lucia
- 5. 1 in 6 people report murders in their neighborhood in St. Kitts & Nevis and in Trinidad & Tobago







## Security tops the list of critical problems in St. Kitts & Nevis and in Trinidad & Tobago














## Upwards of almost 1 in 4 people report personal victimization in the past 5 years by theft or acts of aggression in some Caribbean countries
















### Police are rated as doing a "fairly good job" throughout the Caribbean, with some countries (Bahamas, Barbados, Grenada) performing better than others






