

## Colombia 2001: Study of 4 Large Cities

This study was conducted by Opinómetro using a sample of four cities in Colombia: Bogotá, Medellín, Cali and Barranquilla. While this is not a nationally representative sample, the population that it represents is equivalent to around 1/3 of Colombia's National Population.

The main difference between this and other LAPOP surveys is that the interviews were conducted over the phone. Given that not all Colombian households have a phone line, it was necessary to weight the sample in order to correct for the potential bias introduced by oversampling people with relatively higher socio-economic status. The sample is weighted by socioeconomic status, gender and city size.

Total number of observations is 2,388. The weighted sample has exactly 50% male and 50% female respondents, all of them over the age of 18.
