



El Salvador 1993: Land Tenure study

The study of 1993 in El Salvador focused in land owners and land tenure issues. It was based on a stratified sample of small land holders with different land tenure status. The total sample size for this sample was of 1,161. The study was meant to clarify issues related to land tenure and land reform in light of the various land reforms put in place in the late 1980s.

The interviews were all personal, conducted in a face-to-face and door-to-door mode targeting adult landholders, mainly in rural areas. The fieldwork was conducted by Danny Carr, Inc. The research was carried out in conjunction with the University of Wisconsin Land Tenure Center.

The sample was stratified by patterns of land tenure, as shown in the following table:

The category called “FINATA,” was comprised of those who were former land renters with right to buy land after the land reform of the 1980s was put into effect. The “tenedor” category was created by the Peace Accords that ended the Civil War in that country. These were individuals living on land without title and who were given certain rights by the accords to regularize their control of the land.

The data of this study were presented in the article “Thirty Years of Transformation in the Agrarian Structure of El Salvador: 1961 - 1991” published in the *Latin American Research Review* 30 (3) in 1995, and also in a report: “El Salvador Agricultural Policy Analysis: Land Tenure Study,” co-authored with William Thiesenhusen, Malcolm Childress and Roberto Vidales. This was a report to USAID/El Salvador, September, 1993, Abt. Associates, Cambridge, MA.
