



“Democracy Audit: El Salvador, 1999”

Conducted as a follow up to the 1995 report, this survey research analyzes the attitudes of El Salvadorian citizens towards local government, system support, tolerance, corruption, abstentionism, crime, authoritarianism, trust and their relationship with democracy.

The original sample consisted of 2,400 respondents. 150 interviews were conducted in each of the 14 departments of El Salvador, and an extra sample of 300 respondents was added for the metropolitan area of San Salvador, the country's capital.

The sample was then expanded to 2,900 respondents, after adding 500 interviews from the 28 municipalities where USAID operates project of communitarian development. The complete 2,900 sample is weighted, has an approximate confidence interval of $\pm 1.82\%$ and contains interviews conducted in 69 municipalities throughout the country.
