During the seven-week term, we will approach proper playing techniques, which we will apply by learning a song. History of the art form and its birthplace will be discussed in class, along with easy "homework" assignments (short YouTube videos, articles, listening examples). Recommendations for enrollment: no musical experience needed but helpful; able to stand for 60-75 minutes; reasonable mobility in fingers, wrists, and arms; willingness to practice before class recommended if needed.

OLLI STEEL DRUM BAND - ADVANCED

After excelling in the beginner and intermediate bands, it is time to approach music that is more difficult. We will implement more advanced musical terminology and playing techniques. This group often performs in the Vanderbilt Steel Bands Concert at Blair School of Music, Your success and enjoyment in the band, as well as the band's success, is dependent on regular attendance. Everyone in the band plays an important role. Please make every effort to attend each class. Recommendations for enrollment: prerequisite of the beginner and intermediate levels is required unless instructor permission is granted through invitation or a short audition; reading music is very helpful but not essential as long as you learn quickly by ear; strong rhythmic comprehension is helpful; understanding the concepts of underlying pulse, syncopation, and being able to hear and repeat rhythms is helpful; willingness to practice before class recommended if needed.

REVERSE MEDITATION

This meditation class is open to both beginning and experienced meditators. This winter we will continue our exploration of the territory of meditation by studying Andrew Holecek's Reverse Meditation: How to Use Your Pain and Difficult Emotions as the Doorway to Freedom. Reading Holecek's book is not a requirement for the class, but doing so will deepen your understanding and practice of Reverse Meditation. Holecek is familiar with the realities of physical and emotional pain, and how we habitually contract both somatically and mentally in the face of challenge and difficulty. "Reverse meditations are counter instinctual, counterintuitive, and counter to our normal versions of conditional happiness. They go against the grain of our comfort plan. But these unusual meditations lead to the discovery of unconditional happiness...". This is a quite a large claim, that obstacles, even large ones, can be doorways to opportunity, and that self-defensive contractions can be gifts to unwrap. If you'd like to explore this claim, bring your curiosity, skepticism, and personal experience in joining us for this meditation class.

GORDON PEERMAN

Gordon Peerman is an Episcopal priest, psychotherapist, and mindfulness meditation teacher. He is the author of *Blessed Relief*: What Christians Can Learn from Buddhists about Suffering, and The Body Knows the Way: Coming Home through the Dark Night. For seventeen years he taught at One River Wisdom School Nashville, an interspiritual gathering. He leads retreats and workshops on the intersection of contemplative practice and psychological growth. With his late wife Kathy Woods, he taught mindfulness practices at Vanderbilt's Osher Center for Integrative Health. At Vanderbilt Divinity School, he taught courses in in pastoral theology and Buddhist-Christian Dialogue. He provides spiritual companionship for individuals who wish to explore contemplative practice in daily life.

FUNNY YOU SHOULD MENTION IT: TV COMEDY IN THE 21ST CENTURY

This [comedy] genre breakdown is, in fact, arguably the great artistic advancement seen on television in the last decade." That's how Jennifer Keishen Armstrong described the comedy we download today, the entertainment-business site thewrap. com on June 20, 2022. Built on a foundation of I Love Lucy, All in the Family, The Cosby Show, Seinfeld, and Friends, comedy now is as scripted as it is improv-ed (The Office); as star-driven as it is star-making (Fleabag); as by-the-books formulaic as it is out-of-the box innovative (It's Always Sunny in Philadelphia); and as laugh-out-loud as it is emotionally dramatic (Ted Lasso, Atlanta). This course looks at the current state of primetime sitcoms and of comedy itself, tracking the evolution of the TV comedy from its earlier simpler forms to the more recent complete revision of its writing, structure, pacing and timing, rules, and expectations. BEGINNERS HARMONICA

This six-week course will be led by teaching artist and multitalented instrumentalist and vocalist. Bronson Herrmuth. No prior experience is required. Participants will gain foundational understanding about the diatonic harmonica's design and learn proper ways to clean and care for their instrument. We will learn and practice effective techniques for holding and playing the harmonica, including the "train" exercise to develop lung capacity and use of the diaphragm; the "pucker" technique for playing single notes; how to create vibrato and "bend" notes; and more. While having fun learning simple, familiar songs and playing music together, participants also will be introduced to basic music theory and harmonica tablature. Harmonicas will be provided for all participants.

Course enrollment is limited to 25 participants.

BRONSON HERRMUTH

Bronson Herrmuth has worked in music publishing and production for more than 40 years. He is president of Iowa HomeGrown Music, Al Jolson Black & White Music, Jolie House of Music, and Catfish Dancin' Records. He's produced or co-produced more than 40 artists. Signed as a recording artist with RCA Mexico from 1981-1985 with Iowa band The Ozone Ramblers, he is a songwriter, band leader, multiinstrumentalist, and has toured 42 states and 18 countries as a performer.

CHORAL SINGING


This seven-week course will instruct singers in blending tones, vocal techniques, singing in harmony, and in musicianship as well as prepare the participants to perform a few songs for an audience. Since singing skills build on each other, to benefit most from this seven-week course attendance at each class is encouraged, barring signs of illness.


HOW TO WRITE A MEMOIR

A memoir is creative non-fiction that relies on memories from your own experiences. This eightweek creative non-fiction writing series provides practical information designed to motivate and inspire each participant to write a personal or family memoir one story at a time. Information includes organizational guidelines when planning a story and writing tips to bring characters to life as a story unfolds. There will be writing exercises during class and each participant will be encouraged to write a short memoir to share in class toward the end of this series with kind feedback provided. We will learn from each other. Never doubt that your story matters because sharing it with friends or family could be the best gift you ever give.

Carole Webb Moore-Slater is the author of several books, including a memoir, Letters from the Heart 1943-1946. Other publications include a children's book and various articles printed in national magazines and other publications. Teaching memoir writing to others is a passion and OLLI at Vanderbilt offers this workshop in every session throughout the year. With a background in education and social work, Carole spent her career directing various disability programs in the community, most recently at Vanderbilt University Kennedy Center.

SIR RICHARD FRANCIS BURTON: THE MOST FASCINATING MAN OF THE 19TH CENTURY

Richard Francis Burton was one of the most famous explorers of the 19th century gaining initial recognition for his dangerous pilgrimage in 1853 to the Great Mosque at Mecca disguised as a Muslim. His fame and notoriety increased as he tenaciously pursued the source of the Nile River in East Africa in the 1850s. As a British consul in West Africa, Brazil, Syria, and Trieste from 1861 to 1890, he edited and translated numerous works from Portuguese, German, Arabic, and Sanskrit. One of the greatest linguists of his century, Burton gained even greater notoriety in the 1880s translating and publishing uncensored editions of the Arabian Nights (11 volumes), the Kama Sutra, and a major Arab treatise on homosexuality. In this class, we will look at five of the principal chapters in Burton's life: his pilgrimage to Mecca, the search for the source of the Nile, his travels in Brazil, and his life as the translator of the exotic East and human sexuality.

MARSHALL C. EAKIN

Marshall C. Eakin is distinguished professor of history at Vanderbilt University where he worked since 1983. A specialist in modern Brazilian history, he is the author of six books including: Brazil: The Once and Future Country (St. Martin's, 1997), and A History of Latin America: Collision of Cultures (Palgrave, 2007), Eakin created two video classes with the Great Courses: Conquest of the Americas and The Americas in a Revolutionary Era. His latest book is What Is Latin American History? (Polity Press, 2021). Eakin received his B.A. (1975), and M.A. (1977), from the University of Kansas. He completed his Ph.D. in history at UCLA (1981).

UNDERSTANDING THE PROFESSION OF POLITICS FROM READING POLITICAL BIOGRAPHIES

Is politics a profession like medicine, law, or carpentry? If it is a profession, how can we understand it in a systematic fashion? How do people learn or obtain training to be a politician? Why do people choose to enter the profession? What types of people are likely to be attracted to the profession? How does context influence the profession? What skills are needed to succeed? Does the profession have specializations? How do democratic politicians differ from authoritarian ones? Are there better and lesser politicians? In this course, we will attempt to answer these questions. We will rely on reading, analyzing, and discussing selected chapters from several outstanding biographies to help us focus on a range of notable politicians to identify their commonalities and differences. At the very least, participants may develop a new motivation for reading political biographies as well as an appreciation and better understanding of politicians more generally.

BRUCE OPPENHEIMER

Bruce Oppenheimer is professor emeritus of political science. He taught for 48 years, the last 26 years at Vanderbilt University. His teaching focused on Congress, congressional elections, political parties, and American political institutions. In addition, he would periodically offer a seminar of political biographies. Professor Oppenheimer stays engaged in research and writing. His co-authored book, The 1976 House Majority Leadership Contest: Stepping Stone in the Transition to Conditional Party Government is forthcoming next year, and he remains co-editor of and contributor to Congress Reconsidered, the 13th edition of which will be published in early 2025.

STORIES FROM THE PAST TO THE PRESENT AT THE TENNESSEE STATE MUSEUM

Each session will tell rich Tennessee stories through selected artifacts, e.g., about 6-7 artifacts/objects per class. An example in the Civil War might be the uniform coat of Irish immigrant Hugh Gwyn, which tells the story of immigration, brother-againstbrother (his brother was a Union general), and commitment to the Southern Cause (and what was the cause) long after the war. He founded a Confederate veterans association in California. Dan Pomeroy will introduce each session, but each session will be presented by a knowledgeable and engaging staff member at the Tennessee State Museum. At the end of each session those in-person attendees at the museum will have the opportunity to go upstairs to the exhibit floor for an on-site tour. The tour group will be limited to twenty people, with pre-registration required.

DAN POMEROY

Dan Pomeroy is a retired director of collections & chief curator at Tennessee State Museum, He earned a B.S. and M.A.C.T. (Master of Arts in College Teaching in History), with an emphasis in Southern U.S. History and a Ph.D. in foreign language in U.S. Southern History from The University of Tennessee at Knoxville. Dan currently serves on the Board of Advisors with the Tennessee National Civil War Heritage Area, Tennessee Historical Society, The American Alliance of Museums, and the American Association for State and Local History. Dan has three children, Melinda, Robert, and Will.


THE LIFE AND WORLD OF A 16TH CENTURY EXECUTIONER

We all know the stereotype of pre-modern executioners: sadistic, bloodthirsty, masked men with axes. Thanks, however, to the surviving journal of an actual executioner, Frantz Schmidt (1554-1634) of Nuremberg, we will see how virtually everything we think we know about such men is wrong. In this class we will explore the everyday life of Meister Frantz, as he was popularly known, including his family history, his training, the careful cultivation of his public reputation, and of course the many aspects of his unsavory profession. There will be a minimum of gore and much more psychological analysis of Schmidt and of the larger society that requires frequent torture and public executions. It is a deeply alien world, yet at times uncomfortably similar to our own.

JOEL HARRINGTON

Joel Harrington is centennial professor of history at Vanderbilt. He is the author of many books and articles on early modern Germany, including the basis for this course: The Faithful Executioner: Life and Death. Honor and Shame in the Turbulent Sixteenth Century (Farrar, Straus, Giroux, 2013). The Faithful Executioner has been translated into fourteen languages and is currently being developed as a feature-length film. Harrington's courses at Vanderbilt include The History of Western Christianity, The Figure of Jesus in History, Crime and Punishment in Early Modern Europe, and Magic and Religion in Early Modern Europe. He has taught at Vanderbilt since 1989.

THE 1950S: THE DECADE WHEN EVERYTHING CHANGED

In this course, Carole Bucy will investigate the many changes that took place in the United States and the World in the 1950s, beginning with the Cold War and the fight against the spread of Communism. She will address its impact on American politics. This class will also include a discussion on the impact of consumerism that was unleashed with the coming of television, the Civil Rights Movement, the Youth Culture, and the role of women during this decade.

CAROLE BUCY

Carole Bucy is professor of history emeritus at Volunteer State Community College with degrees in history from Baylor University, George Peabody College, and Vanderbilt University. She also currently holds the honorary position of Davidson County Historian. She regularly conducts teacher workshops on the incorporation of Tennessee history into existing U.S. history courses and is a frequent speaker across the state on a variety of historical subjects. She was a researcher for the Nashville Public Library's Votes for Women Room, which opened in February 2020, in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of Tennessee ratification of the 19th Amendment that gave women across the United State the right to vote.
