VU Political Science Takes Home APSA Awards

Hye Young You and her co-authors received the Deil S. Wright Award for the best paper in the Federalism and Governmental Relations section at the 2016 APSA meetings for their paper entitled, “Cities as Lobbyists.”

Noam Lupu received the 2016 Jack Walker Award from the Political Organizations and Parties section at the annual APSA meeting in September.

Cecilia Mo was the recipient of the 2016 “Best Article in *Political Behavior*” award from APSA’s Elections, Public Opinion and Voting Behavior section for her piece entitled “The Consequences of Explicit and Implicit Gender Attitudes and Candidate Quality in the Calculation of Voters.”

Efrén Pérez will be awarded the Early Career Award from the Latino Caucus of the Midwest Political Science Association at the upcoming MPSA meetings in Chicago.

Larry Bartels and coauthor Christopher Achen received the Association of American Publishers PROSE Award for the year’s best book on Government & Politics, for their work entitled *Democracy for Realists: Why Elections Do Not Produce Responsive Government*. The book was also included in Bloomberg’s list of “The Best Books of 2016” by Jason Furman, chairman of President Obama’s Council of Economic Advisers.

Marc Hetherington received the Philip E. Converse Book Award at APSA for his book, co-authored with Jonathan Weiler, entitled *Authoritarianism and Polarization in America* (Cambridge University Press). The Phillip Converse Award is given by the Elections, Public Opinion, and Voting Behavior Section of APSA for “an outstanding book in the field published at least five years before.”

We were pleased to welcome four new faculty members to our community in the fall of 2016. **Allison Anoll** (Stanford Ph.D. 2016) began as assistant professor of American politics specializing in race and ethnic politics in the U.S. **Noam Lupu** (Princeton Ph.D. 2011) came to Vanderbilt from the University of Wisconsin as associate professor of comparative politics and associate director of the Latin American Public Opinion Project. His research interests include comparative political behavior and political parties. **Tariq Thachil** (Cornell Ph.D. 2009) joined us as an associate professor of comparative politics after spending several years as a faculty member at Yale. Prof. Thachil's work concerns political party development and political behavior in emerging democracies. Last but not least, **Sharece Thrower** (Princeton Ph.D. 2013) arrived as an assistant professor of American politics, coming to Vanderbilt from the University of Pittsburgh. Prof. Thrower's work centers on the policymaking dynamics of U.S. political institutions.

In the fall of 2017 we will also welcome two additions to our IR faculty. **Bradley Smith** joins us as an assistant professor from Rochester University where his research focuses on international conflict and cooperation. **Peter Schram** (Stanford Ph.D. 2016) will also join the department as an assistant professor of international relations. His current work focuses on the organizational design of terrorist organizations.
