Vanderbilt has teamed with the Electric Power Research Institute (EPRI) and the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) to build an integrated solar-assisted electric vehicle charging station on campus. Known as a Smart Modal Area Recharge Terminal, or TVA SMART™ station, the facility will be part of a research project designed to produce data that will assist in developing a larger infrastructure to support electric vehicles throughout the state. The station will provide information on energy usage, the time when the equipment is used, the amount of solar-generated electricity produced and stored, and the potential impact of load clusters – when several vehicles are refueled at the same time – on distribution system reliability. Up to 10 cars will be able to charge at the station, which will be located off Broadway in a Vanderbilt parking lot between The Center building and the Vanderbilt Law School. Vanderbilt Green Fund solar installation combines student initiative, renewable energy technology

An innovative solar energy installation now adorns a concrete silo at the Vanderbilt co-generation power plant. The 8.16 kilowatt student-initiated solar project – made possible by funding from the Vanderbilt Green Fund (VGF) – incorporates renewable energy technologies while providing access to usable, real-time electricity generation data. Vanderbilt students Jacob Choi and Erik Werner authored one of the 24 proposals submitted to the VGF for student-initiated green projects. Choi and Werner’s proposal was considered by a selection committee as one of the three best and received funding. The VGF, established in 2010 for the implementation of student-initiated sustainability projects aimed at reducing utility consumption on campus, is led by Vanderbilt Student Government (VSG). The monies for the VGF come from Vanderbilt Plant Operations and the Office of Housing and Residential Education (OHARE). Read the [full article](#) for more information.

After the game, the total waste and recycling generated and attendance will be calculated and submitted to the Game Day Recycling Challenge organizers. The schools that generate the least amount of waste per person in attendance at the game will be announced as the winners in November. The Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Game Day Challenge is a friendly competition for colleges and universities to promote waste reduction at their football games. Walker named recycling coordinator, spearheads recycling effort at Move In



Lindsay Walker was named campus recycling coordinator July 1, in time to spearhead recycling efforts at August's first-year student Move In, which resulted in the recycling of 34 percent more cardboard than last year – almost 18 tons in one day – and two 26-foot trucks full of Styrofoam and plastic film. As campus recycling coordinator, Walker's duties include managing the recycling programs that serve classrooms, offices, student centers and research buildings on campus as well as the residential student recycling program; athletics recycling at football, basketball and baseball events; and coordinating recycling for large events such as Earth Friendly Move In, Move Out and Commencement. 2011 Senior Day speaker Wangari Maathai dies

Wangari Maathai, winner of the 2004 Nobel Peace Prize who spoke at Vanderbilt's Senior Day activities in May, has died following a battle with cancer at age 71. Maathai founded the Green Belt Movement, which seeks to promote democracy, human rights and environmental conservation through the planting of trees in Maathai's native Kenya and throughout Africa. Her most recent book, *Replenishing the Earth: Spiritual Values for Healing Ourselves and the World*, discussed the incorporation of multiple aspects of sustainability into a whole life.
